When we looked into it, we came to the conclusion that it was not quite finished, but that it was one of the reasons why so many fish were dying. The expert explained to us that one of the reasons could be the consequences of the cold snap that had occurred a few weeks before. Some draughts that created some pockets without oxygen, which did not benefit the fauna of the place.

In addition, it could have released a large amount of water full of pollutants from nearby beaches, which also caused thousands of fish to die. This was also caused by the farmers in the area who over-fertilised the land with nitrates, which caused the water to leak out into the sea.
